Served as counsel for persons facing an array of civil rights violations, including transgender employees subjected to employment discrimination, individuals denied same gender marriage recognition, and an intersex child subjected to medically unnecessary sex-assignment surgery. Also engaged in policy advocacy and worked in coalition with members of impacted communities.
